IARLD Gent had 6 Symposia, 4 Round Tables and 28 posters.

Professor Linda Siegel presented the William M Cruickshank Lecture. # The William M. Cruickshank Memorial Lecture

Prof. Siegel stated that we know how to do all these and provided evidence for these solutions. She elaborated on the need to turn our ef orts toward making them a reality.

#### **Biography**

Prof. Linda Siegel is the former Dorothy C. Lam Chair in Special Education and an Emeritus Professor in the Department of Educational and Counselling Psychology and Special Education at the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, Canada. She has over 200 publications on early identification and intervention to prevent reading problems, dyslexia, reading and language development, mathematical concept learning, mathematical learning disabilities, and children learning English as a second language. She has been the President of the Division of Learning Disabilities of the Council on Exceptional Children. In 2004, she was awarded an honorary doctorate from Goteborg University in Sweden. In 2010, she was awarded the Gold Medal for Excellence in Psychological Research from the Canadian Psychological Association. In 2012 she was awarded the Eminent Researcher Award from the Learning Dif culties Association of Australia.

She has recently published a book entitled Not Stupid, Not Lazy: Understanding Dyslexia and Other Learning Disabilities. This book is published by the International Dyslexia Association.

# Workshop for Chinese Reading Disabilities in Malaysia

Dr. Li-Yu Hung

Since a great Chinese population learn their native language in schools in Malaysia, those students with reading dif culties lack Chinese remediation from public schools or private Chinese schools. Little Ark Caring Center, the private center in Kuala Lumpur, mainly provides special education service to Chinese population in KL neighborhood. The founder of center, Ms. Docras Ching Swee Chin, found the emergent needs and invited Dr. Li-Yu Hung to of er a workshop for their teachers and consultation to parents. Dr. Hung worked with her doctoral student, Ms. Hsuan-Hui Wang, for the 2-day workshop titled "Help kids with Chinese reading disabilities" on August 25 to 26 2018. About 30 participants registered and came from dif erent areas of Malaysia. They felt satisf ed at the new knowledge about reading disabilities and learning disabilities. Teachers and some parents found the way to understand their children's dif culties in schools. Those reading disabled students living outside the areas where mother language spoken lack the access to professional services. Good knowledge helps them to understand the problems and f nd the hope to solve the problem.



## Morphological processing and its relation to reading: A study of Dutch-speaking children with dyslexia Jeremy M Law (University of Glasgow, Scotland, UK) and Pol Ghesquière (KULeuven, Belgium)

#### **Abstract**

This study examines the processing of derivational morphology and associations with literacy outcomes, phonological awareness and orthographic skills of 19 Dutch-speaking children with dyslexia and 55 age-matched typical reading control children in f fth grade. A masked priming experiment was used where semantic, orthographic and morphological relation between prime and target pairs were manipulated as part of a lexical decision task. Signif cant priming ef ects were found in each group. Children with dyslexia were found to only beneft from the morpho-semantic information while controls were found to be influenced by both morpho-orthographic and morpho-semantic information. Morpho-semantic priming ef ects were found to correlate with the performance on time-sensitive literacy measures of children with dyslexia while no relation was observed in controls.

# CONFERENCE REPORT 42st Annual Conference of the

# International Academy for Research in Learning Disabilities

We received 49 proposals. There were 6 for Symposia. We had 5 proposals for a Round Table, and we had 38 Poster proposals. We selected all 6 Symposia and 4 Round Tables, but asked the presenters to adapt their first versions to some questions /remarks of the reviewers. The fifth round table on inclusion was too immature. We accepted 30 posters. However two persons withdrew or cancelled their posters.

All proposals were reviewed by at least three reviewers: Stephanie Al Otaiba, Pol Ghesquière, Georgios Sideridis, Lee Swanson, Christa Van Kraayenoord, Petra Warreyn and/or Annemie Desoete.

Professor **Linda Siegel** presented the William M Cruickshank Lecture.

There were 28 posters, with some of them identified as eligible for the Poster Award. **Jeremy Law** received the Janette Klingner poster Award of this conference. In total 37 people attended the guided tour at the beginning of the conference. Moreover 91 people (including the 12 persons assisting with the conference) pre-registered for the conference. Not all of them payed.

Not every person payed the registration fee. We also had to refund Li-Chih Wang. In total 27 active members, 2 retired members, 28 non-members and 22 students registered. We got funding of Netwerk Leerproblemen of 2000 euro. In return two of the non-members attended the conference for free.

In addition total 40 people attended the conference dinner/banquet. Due to the limited number of people attending the banquet, the price of the menu was higher than the payment of the dinner done by the attendees.

**Income was 29609,44 euro or 34033.13 dollar.** We received a deposit (2500 USD in cheque) at the conferences for the support and technician service, hire of the accommodation, hire for the poster boards, and the Banquet Hotel Restaurant. We went to the bank and got 2097,82 euro for this cheque
